Empowering Student Voice



RESPOND to conversations that occur within your school and community by identifying problems people are having and what changes could make things better. Student leadership teams can identify and solve problems, especially when many voices are heard.



PRESENT your suggestions about forming student leadership teams and hearing others' ideas about what is needed and what could change. Discuss these questions:

CREATE a plan for organizing student leadership groups and the projects each group will address. Develop a timeframe and metrics to measure progress. Consider including in your plan:

- a mission statement that identifies the desired outcomes or changes;
- a launch event to announce what needs and challenges will be addressed;
- posters and informational advertisements to communicate the goals (in the building, on the school's website and to local media outlets); and
- collaboration with parents' and teachers' associations or other organizations that have similar goals.
